She is a member of the Waldensian Church and her selection as a PC(USA) International Peacemaker reflects her denomination's high involvement in working to assimilate refugees from the Middle East and Africa. Faced with the crisis of asylum seekers desperate to reach European shores, the “Mediterranean Hope” Project is on the front lines in Italy, offering relocation assistance, advocacy and limited housing for vulnerable individuals and children.

Ms. Schellenbaum has also contributed to the Waldensian's National Commission on Families and marriage, again working to facilitate dialog within congregations when faced with societal change.

The Presbyterian Peacemaking Program makes it possible for leaders from partner denominations and partner organizations around the world to visit the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) each year to interpret issues of peace and justice. Since 1984 over 220 International Peacemakers from more than 57 countries have been hosted by Presbyterians.
